God's Work Our Hands

One focus of this year's God's Work
Our Hands service project will be supporting
young adults who may be current or former
members of the foster care system or who are
homeless or unaccompanied. Our intention is
to partner with Penn State University's
Fostering Lions Program, Kutztown
University's PROFS program (Providing
Resources and Opportunities for Future Stand
Outs) and Angel Network's efforts to provide
resources to students in need of immediate
assistance.



Our support and service will materialize in the form of a collection of needed items and their assembly into "resource baskets" according to the direction we receive from the parterning programs. Please watch for announcements later in July regarding specific collection items if you would like to provide a donation and/or participate in assemling the resource baskets on September 24th at the church. As one student in the Fostering Lions Program put it, "My favorite part of the program is just having an extra support person and knowing that if I need something, someone is always in my corner to help me out. This is a great opportunity for kids like me in this situation — it's great to have someone that wants us to do well and will help us get what we need."

Another focus of GWOH's Sunday will include the creative talents of our Spirit Rejoicers for making greeting cards for shut-ins and Meals on Wheels.

Our service projects will also involve our Lutheran Disaster Response team members' participation in an open house event at St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Bethlehem on September 10th coordinated by Lutheran Congregational Services. The event will include demonstrations and discussions about LDR's mission work experiences involving basic aspects of on-site rebuilding as well as a collection for hygiene kits and flood buckets.

Community Food Bank Garden in Need of a Volunteer Leader

It was Divine Purpose that created Marilyn Egner's compassion for the needy leading her to start a Community Food Bank Garden. She and her husband Frank often told us about the great appreciation they received from the recipients of the garden's harvest. That in itself they said, was payment enough for their time and talent in keeping the garden growing. Upon Marilyn's passing away on February 12th, Frank agreed to continue growing the garden this year in honor of Marilyn. Thank you Frank! His steadfast attention and leadership will end when this year's growing season ends. His dedication to the garden will undoubtedly leave it in an outstanding condition ready for the 2024 growing season. Which brings us to the topic of the need for a new garden leader volunteer.

The Community Food Bank Garden has some small differences when compared to an ordinary run-of-the-mill backyard garden. Yes, there's planning and planting, cultivating and weeding (albeit very little), watering, and harvesting. Planning can be a bit more involved in order to keep the harvest of various veggies coming throughout the entire growing season. And harvesting requires timely deliveries in sync with food bank distributions. But there are also some big differences compared to a backyard garden. Goat manure is available (and can be delivered) from John Mosovsky's farm and compost can be obtained from Emmaus Borough. Money is available for seed and/or starter plants. AND the garden leader will have the full support of the Outreach Mission Team, the backing of the church congregation, and the blessings that come with supporting God's Mission. The Community Garden leader will not work alone.

WHEN IS A QUILT MORE THAN A BLANKET TO SNUGGLE UNDER?

When it protects little bodies from a cold, damp floor. A recent video from Lutheran World Relief shared that 1 in 3 children in Tanzania suffers from stunting. As a result, not only are their bodies smaller, but they get sick more often, take longer to recover, are developmentally delayed and have trouble learning. One of the major causes is malnutrition.

In a 2020 study by the Arica Health Institute, it was found that in the cold, mountainous region of Njombe region, where many of the children experience stunting, one of the drivers for stunting was that the children had to use so much energy to keep their little bodies warm, this used up a lot of the nutrition that would otherwise go to helping them grow. By placing quilts under the children, the children's bodies can use more of the nutrition they do take in for normal growth and development.

Volunteers in the Njombe region partnered with Lutheran World Relief to provide quilts for the children. Now, with the final shipment of quilts due shortly, it is anticipated that 9,000 little ones will soon have a warmer place to sit and eat.

The message back to us is, Asante. Asante Sana. Thank you. Thank you very much.
