History of a Labyrinth

- > Ancient patterns found all over the world
- ➤ Date back some 4000 years or more
- ➤ Many types of labyrinths share a single overall design
- > Their origin is mysterious
- > Their uses are as varied as their patterns are

What Is a Labyrinth?

> A Unicursal Labyrinth

A single continuous path that leads from a beginning point to a center and back out again and presents no navigational challenge

> A Maze


A complex branching multicursal puzzle with choices of paths and directions and an opportunity to get frustrated or lost

Where Did Labyrinths Start?

- > No particular start known
- > An archetype in the human mind
- > Found in archaic petroglyphs
- > Found in Amerindian basket weaving designs
- > Paintings and drawings all over the world
- ➤ Earliest reported labyrinth in a two story building in Egypt described by Greek historian Herodotus
- > The name comes from Cretan structure in the myth of Ariadne, Theseus and the Minotaur
- > Ancient Cretan coins
- ➤ Middle Ages formed on colored paving stones in floors of cathedral naves all over Europe

What Do Labyrinths Look Like?


- Labyrinths are named by type
- > Further identified by their number of circuits




Right-Handed or Left-Handed Labyrinths

- > Left or right-handed labyrinths are determined by the direction of the first turn after entering the labyrinth
- > Two-thirds of the ancient Classical or Cretan labyrinths were right-handed
- > Two-thirds of the modern Classicals are left-handed
- ➤ Neither is better than the other it is totally up to personal preference

Right-Handed




Left-Handed

1 Seven-circuit Cretan pattern




The Two Best-Known Labyrinth Types are

Eleven-circuit Chartres pattern, which is on the floor of the cathedral at Chartres, France (and used by many churches today)




Figure 2. The medieval Chartres labyrinth design



Why Walk a Labyrinth?

- ➤ In Ancient times a cathedral labyrinth was a substitute for going on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem
- > A spiritual tool -prayer, walking meditation, site of rituals and ceremony, choreographed dance
- > Personal, psychological or spiritual transformation
- > Enhance right brain activity
- Community building
- ➤ A way to relax, renew your spirit
- > Negotiate a new behavior
- Give thanks, express joy for blessings
- > Express sorrow or grief
- Seek answers to questions long asked
- > Find healing, creativity, mindfulness, sense of wholeness

.... And so much more!

How Might You Feel When You Walk a Labyrinth?

- > Each labyrinth experience is different
- ➤ Walking a labyrinth is a very personal endeavor
- > You may feel nothing or have a powerful reaction
- ➤ It is important to follow the pace your body chooses

How are Labyrinths Used for Kids and Teens?

- > Successfully used in schools, childcare centers, playgrounds, camps and other programs
- ➤ Labyrinth activities support math, language, history, art and physical education
- > Welcome new students, help kids grieve losses, resolve conflicts
- > Fundraise, celebrate graduations, host community events
- > Help students to calm down, make transitions and focus

Labyrinths and Young Children

- > They enjoy playing on the labyrinth -dance, run, skip, cartwheel
- > Consider creating a time when this is invited
- ➤ However, it is important to teach them how to use the labyrinth as a quiet prayer tool and to respect others who are doing so

As you can see, for as many types of labyrinths there are, there are as many uses for the labyrinth!

- > September 2019: We built a Pumpkin labyrinth in the upper field build it, walk it, share it

Examples of possible uses:


Catechism classes, adult faith formation, women's retreat, men's retreat, adult group activities, mission teams, other liturgical events such as lent or advent, taize prayer sessions, events with youth and families

Use to offer prayer, meditation, to kick off a program or to give thanks for a successful event, etc.

The labyrinth pattern is centuries old and has been walked by millions of people from many cultures. A labyrinth is not a maze. It is not a puzzle designed to trick or fool you. It is a path to be trusted and is designed to lead you. The labyrinth is a special pathway set aside for reflection, self-examination, prayer, behavior modification or the development of new behaviors. The rhythm of walking, of placing one foot in front of the other; empties the mind, relaxes the body and refreshes the spirit. Walking a labyrinth is a very personal endeavor.

The Lutheran Church of the Holy Spirit now has a labyrinth. If you represent a group in the congregation wishing to use the labyrinth please complete and submit the Holy Spirit Labyrinth Request form. You will receive confirmation that the request form has been received and will be contacted regarding your request. The second form, the Holy Spirit Labyrinth Use Report, is to be completed following the use of the labyrinth.

What is the Labyrinth Suitcase?

It is exactly that – a suitcase on wheels that includes the 12 foot x 12 foot Heart of Chartres Labyrinth and everything you will need to set up your Labyrinth

everything you will need to set up your Labyrinth experience


- > Prayer rug to designate the entrance
- > Instructions for facilitators
- > Shoe covers for labyrinth walkers
- > Tea lights to provide soothing low lit atmosphere
- > Finger labyrinth handouts to take home
- CD player and discs for soothing background
- Small box/ basket with slips of paper and pencils to leave a prayer request
- Another box/basket for prayer requests
- Instructions for use and care of the labyrinth







Preparation for Walking the Labyrinth Handout



- > Booties over socks and shoes no bare feet
- > No food or drinks on the labyrinth
- > Generally, no more than 2 or 3 on the labyrinth at one time

The Labyrinth can be walked in 4 stages:

Remember – before walking the labyrinth

Release – walking into the labyrinth

Receive – standing in the center

Return – walking out of the labyrinth

What Happens After You Borrow the Labyrinth?

- > Fold up the labyrinth
- > Return all supplies to the labyrinth suitcase
- > Return the Labyrinth suitcase to the designated location
- > Fill out the Labyrinth use report on-line and submit
